## Literature searches

- Which databases or search engines will you be using to search for peer-reviewed or grey literature?
- What are the keywords or search terms you will be using? Please also include an example of a combination of search terms with boolean operators.
- Are you applying any language restrictions? (e.g. English only)
- Are you applying any date restrictions? (e.g. 1950 to present)
- For research articles, are you applying any restrictions in terms of type of study (e.g. human studies only, registered clinical trials)?
- Try running the search in one of the peer-reviewed and grey literature databases of choice and describe what comes up - e.g. number of hits, general assessment of the relevance of those hits.
- Describe the strategy for reviewing and abstracting the literature found, for example:
- scan titles, abstracts and/or full documents for relevance;
- search reference lists of relevant/key papers for additional sources not captured through the parent search;
- document the number of sources excluded vs included;
- Extract relevant information from each included source (e.g. author(s), publication date, relevant contextual evidence/information that will support the policy recommendation)

## **Key informant interviews (if applicable)**

- Who will be interviewed?
- What is the purpose of the interview?
- What will be the guiding questions for the conversation?

- How will you document the conversation (e.g. recording, note-taking)
- How will you obtain consent from the interviewee to use his/her perspectives/opinions for the purposes of this assignment?

## **Analysis and synthesis**

Describe the approach for analyzing and synthesizing the evidence/information collected from the included sources. For example:

- tabulate the findings and do a quantitative summary (such as number of sources that support X aspect of the argument);
- map the relevant points from key sources and do a narrative summary to build context, highlight the scope of the issue, strengthen the case/argumen, etc. Can also strategically highlight some points that oppose the argument.
